The History of Pastel by Pascale Doumerc

On Monday 13th April, members were treated to a very special and rewarding evening when one of our members, Pascale Doumerc presented an illustrated presentation on the History of Pastel. Pascale's background and experience in Art History certainly showed as she took us on a chronological trip from the 15th century to the recent, demonstrating the central role that pastel has played in the history of painting generally. Here are some of the highlights of Pascale's presentation:







- The word 'pastel' is thought to have come from "pastello" from "pasta", and coined by da Vinci because of pastel's thick paste-like consistency, but it was surprising to learn that one of the earliest traded colours was a blue pigment, "the Blue Treasure" extracted from the yellow flower of the pastel plant that grows in the Lauraguais region of France, as well as other parts of Asia and Siberia.
- From initially three colours red (from haematite), black (black stone) and white (chalk and clay), the manufacture of pastels developed in the 1700s with the prestigious La Maison du Pastel manufacurer in France, taken over eventually by Henri Roche. Today, these Roche pastels are still hand-made, with few concessions to modern day techniques, and are prized by pastellists the word over for their consistency of colour and texture.
- Initially in the 1500-1600s, pastel was associated with the art of portraiture, firstly as a drawing medium, and then with the development of the softer pastels, as a painting medium. With war and a downturn in portrait painting, by 18th century pastel had gone into a decline.
- In the 19th century, a resurgence had begun, and painters like Odilon Redon, Mary Cassatt, Whistler, and of course the Impressionists, particularly Degas, placed pastel firmly in the painter's realm as a recognised medium.
- Today, the pastel medium enriched by past experiments, artists of renown, and supported by the huge range of products offered by such great names as Sennelier, Roche, and Rembrandt is again experiencing resurgence. Contempory artists such as Daniel Greene, Ken Paine and others, particularly in North America contribute to this resurgence. As Pascale concluded her presentation "we count today a great number of pastel societies which promote their artists and kindle the public's attention for this art form, being committed to restore the medium to the level of popularity it once enjoyed".

Thank you Pascale for a wonderful, illustrated overview of our chosen medium.
